...AND THAT HAS MADE ALL THE DIFFERENCE

In his renowned poem, "The Road Not Taken," Robert Frost presents a traveler standing at the precipice of a decision. Two roads diverge in a yellow wood, and he, acknowledging that each

road leads to a separate destiny, chooses "the one less traveled by." This decision, he concludes, "has made all the difference." It is a poetic device that resonates deeply within the Christian soul, particularly as we gather to celebrate Easter; for, at the heart of our faith lies a similar divergence of paths—one broad, well-trodden, and easy; the other narrow, demanding, yet leading to the glorious joy of resurrection.

Easter morning does not merely celebrate an event; it affirms a choice—a road taken by Christ Himself. When faced with the temptation to retreat from suffering, He pressed forward. When offered an easier path, He bore the cross. In so doing, He carved out a road of grace, love, and redemption that we are now invited to follow. Consider, for a moment, the implications of this journey. The world, with its clever cynicism and modern disenchantment, often takes the broader road—a road marked by expedience, self-interest, and comfortable pragmatism. This road is filled with human attempts to engineer happiness to construct meaning from the shifting sands of mere existence. It is the road of self-sufficiency, where we convince ourselves that we are the sole architects of our fate. And yet, it is a road that ultimately leads to despair, for no human edifice can withstand the winds of mortality.

The road Jesus offers, by contrast, is difficult, paved with suffering and sacrifice. It is a road of faith, where the traveler does not always see the destination but walks forward in trust. It is a road that asks us to relinquish control, to love our enemies, to die to self so that we may truly live. And yet, paradoxically, this road—this hard, unglamorous road—is the one that leads to joy. "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full," Jesus tells us (John 10:10). His resurrection is the fruition of this promise.

As we explored that first Sunday of Lent, Robert Frost's traveler recognizes that the path he chose "has made all the difference." For the Christian, the road of resurrection makes all the difference—not just in some abstract philosophical sense, but in the reality of daily living. Easter is not a quaint tradition of pastel dresses and white buck shoes; it is the very engine of Christian hope. It reorients our journey. It transforms the burdens of suffering into the birth pangs of new creation. It takes the tragedies of this fallen world and, through divine grace, turns them into triumphs. It affirms, above all, that death does not have the final word.

Our Reformed theology, rooted in both rigorous intellect and deep devotion, has long emphasized the sovereignty of God in human affairs. And so, as we consider Easter through the lens of Frost's poem, we are reminded that our steps are not random wanderings in a meaningless void. Rather, we are called to take the road of discipleship—the road of trust in the risen Christ, who has gone before us and prepares a place for us.

On this Easter morning, let us therefore rejoice in the road less traveled. Let us stand at the divergence and boldly choose the path of faith. For it is in this choice that we find not only a distant, heavenly reward, but the present, abiding joy of walking with our risen Lord. And that, indeed, makes all the difference.

So, how did a California physics major who provided motion studies for the film industry end up in Rutherford County, Tennessee? The answer is horses, but we will come to that later.




